The Psychology of Belief


Confirmation bias *Seeking out information that aligns with existing beliefs*

Evidence is more persuasive when it favors something we want to believe





AVAAZ Facebook's Algorithm: A Major Threat to Public Health

- Global health misinformation spreading networks spanning at least five countries generated an estimated 3.8 billion views on Facebook in the last vear.
- Only 16% of all health misinformation analysed had a warning label from Facebook. Despite their content being fact-checked, the other 84% of articles and posts sampled in this report remain online without warnings.









